Caught red handed in Campello

Local police officers in El Campello have arrested two men who allegedly specialise in stealing high-end cars broken into with sophisticated electronic equipment.

The detainees had devices for unlocking the electronic control unit and even the possibility of erasing the VIN number, according to a statement from the town hall.

An ordinary local police patrol on Calle San Ramon, accompanied by a Guardia Civil patrol, observed a man on the right side of the road wearing a short-sleeved shirt, which was strange given the low temperatures at the time, noted a council spokesman.



This aroused the officers' suspicion that he was acting as a lookout, which led them to discover that just across the road, in a car park, another man was crouching and manipulating the passenger door of a Hyundai Tucson.

The police then stopped their patrol cars level with the two men, at which point they began to walk 'in a hurried, evasive manner in the opposite direction of the officers, with the intention of evading the police, and were caught a few metres away'.

When they were stopped, they were identified and said that they did not know each other, but with many inconsistencies that made the police and Guardia Civil even more suspicious.

One of the detainees had a criminal record for vehicle theft. so a search was carried out and items that could be used for this type of crime were found among his belongings.

A black plastic bag containing a complete car-opening kit and materials normally used for car theft was found next to the vehicle they were tampering

After their arrest, the two men were taken to the Guardia Civil headquarters, where they were charged with attempted car theft, as they had already started tampering with the ve-

The prime suspect was found to be already wanted by one court in Orihuela and the third man was wanted to serve a prison sentence by another, so he has been jailed while the other two were granted conditional bail.

Officers are still trying to determine whether the goods which they recovered in searches but have not yet returned may have been stolen in other burglaries.

Denia to join scheme safeguarding domestic violence victims' pets

Denia council intends to sign up with a government scheme offering protection to beloved family pets whose owners are affected by domestic violence.

Launched by Spain's ministry for social rights and Agenda 2030, the VIOPET programme is set to be a game-changer for abuse victims by providing temporary foster care for their dogs, cats and other animals.

Research has shown that people in violent relationships are often unable to leave their aggressors because they cannot keep their pets in hotels, emergency rentals or sheltered accommodation, and refuse to leave them behind.

Also, serial abusers have been known to harm their victims' much-loved animals as a way to hurt the person, and



the owner may have no way of keeping their pets safe from this vicarious violence.

Through VIOPET, they can place their furry friends out of harm's way in foster care, or give them a temporary home when the victims themselves are forced to flee their domestic situation.

Survivors can then get their pets back once they are settled and safe.

In Denia, the scheme would be coordinated by the police, working closely with local animal shelters APAD and Llogaret Felí.

These rescue centres would either set aside space on their premises, or place the animals with trusted members and volunteers to be looked after in their own homes.

Ooh beehive!

The spring weather has intensified the amount of work for Cartagena municipal fire brigade to remove beehives, reported city hall.


They have been called

Islanders hope for a ferry

The concession to run the first regular public transport service between Santa Pola and the island of Tabarca was put out to tender by the regional government last week.

The five-year contract is worth €2.1 million and can be extended by up to five years

The aim is to provide the 70-or-so inhabitants of the smallest populated island in the country, and the only one in Valencia region, with a regular line all year round to the nearest point on the mainland, where they usually do for their day-to-day chores.

The regional infrastructure department will decide the best bid based on the conditions it has set, including evaluation of ticket prices, the type of boat and the services offered.

A department spokesman told state news agency EFE that Tabarca already has private services aimed just at tourists, but this concession is not so interesting in financial terms because it will also cover out-of-season periods to serve residents.

The president of the 'Isla residents' associ-Plana' ation, Carmen Martí said

their request for such a service had been taken into account after the tender launched by the previous regional government received no bids at all.

'We hope it will be resolve this time because insularity cannot be an obstacle to enjoying the same tights as residents of any other part of Alicante," she commented

They are calling for a minimum of three boats per day at set times all year round, in addition to any additional ones which the concessionary may wish to pro-

Brits warned about golf buggies

British residents of Cartagena learned about road safety in a talk by municipal firefighters. local police and the N332 association at La Manga club.

More than 100 people attended the meeting on April 19, which councillor for the coast Gonzalo López said was a key element to avoid traffic accidents and update knowledge.

The talks started with the president of La Manga Clubs property owners' community, Andrew Millard, followed by the director of Cartagena public safety school (ESPAC), Manuel Asensio and he head of the fire extinction services, Francisco Gómez.

The N332 association emphasised one of the biggest problems in the resort, small electric vehicles, especially golf buggies, saying that many Britons do not know the regulations for these vehicles and therefore the majority are used in an illegal manner.

Over 2,434 marijuana plants weighing approximately 135 kilos were found in the unit in the centre of Els Poblets, which

of a 44-year-old Albanian man.

As is usually the case, the address was not registered with any utility board, but was found to be using an extremely high amount of electricity, disproportionate to its size, occupation or

In total, the warehouse has consumed over €90,000 in electricity, none of which has been paid for.

It took from November until nearly Easter before police were able to confirm their suspicions and, on inspection, Guardia Civil officers in neighbouring El Verger - the nearest force to Els Poblets - discovered four makeshift rooms had been fashioned using plasterboard and planks of wood, each with a complex ventilation system which failed to disguise the tell-tale smell of cannabis.

The man whose name appears on the rental agreement is said to have a criminal record for similar activities in the province of A Coruña, in Spain's far north-western region of Galicia.

He reportedly lived in the warehouse, spending long periods without stepping outside, to avoid discovery, as well as 'acquiring' massive piles of pre-used soil and broken-down machinery.

The machinery had been repaired in order to use in harvesting the hash plants, police







What happens at a sexual health check-up?

An expert explains why STI testing is so important - for everyone.

With record levels of gonorrhoea and syphilis cases reported by the Health Security Agency, it's important to take sexual health seriously - and not just for young people.

In fact, the number of common sexually transmitted infections (STIs) among over-65s increased by 20% from 2017 to 2019, according to the Local Government Association.

This is why if you are sexually active, regular testing is necessary whatever your age - even if you don't have any symptoms.

"Sexual health check-ups are important because STIs can be silent but can also have significant health implications," says Dr Priyanka Patel, consultant ambulatory

gynaecologist at London Gynaecology.

"STIs such as chlamydia can affect female fertility, and STIs such as HIV weaken the immune system."

Dr Patel talks through some key points about STI screening..

How often should you have an STI check?

"You need to have an STI check whenever you have a new partner, especially if you're not using condoms, or think you were exposed to an STI," says Patel.

"Everyone should have an STI screen, including an HIV test, every year if having sex without condoms with new or casual partners."

Testing is also advised for anyone who develops possible symptoms. These may include unusual discharge from the vagina, penis or anus; pain when peeing; blisters. sores, lumps or skin growths on the genitals or anus; itching or a rash.

What will you be asked at a check-up?

You can find your nearest sexual health clinic or doctor to book an appointment. Many sexual health services now offer free self-sampling kits to order online for people who don't have any symptoms and want to do a check-up at home.

"Men may have to hold their urine before testing, but women do not need to do anything in particular to prepare." Patel says.

"You will be asked about your sexual history, partners, contraceptive use and general health. You will be asked for details about your recent sexual partners and types of sex

These questions may feel personal or intrusive but are important to ensure the correct tests are done. Remember, taking care of your sexual health is about being safe and empowered and healthcare professionals are there to help.

What tests are done?

"The testing will depend on the answers you give about the types of sex you have," says Patel. "Vaginal, throat and anal swabs may be done - these will be used to test for chlamydia and gonorrhoea."

To do this, the clinician rubs a cotton bud inside the area for a few seconds. A blood sample will be taken to test for syphilis and HIV.

Patel continues: "If you have symptoms, then the clinician will usually carry out a speculum examination to look at the health of the vagina and cervix."

How do you get STI test results?

The way your results are delivered varies between clinics, and they will advise when you should expect to hear back.

"Most will send results via a text message or give you a number to call for results.' says Patel, while some have a 'no news is good news' policy, meaning if you don't hear anything then you've got the all-clear.

For home testing kits, you'll get a notification to say your samples were received and results are usually sent via text message.

"If you test positive for an STI, they will arrange for treatment and offer support," Patel explains - which goes for both clinic and self-sampling.She adds: "It's important to notify partners of any positive results and the sexual health clinic can also assist in anonymous partner notification."

How to keep your brain sharp in your 50s and beyond

There are numerous things

you can do to maintain brain function in older age.

The pandemic lockdown has had a "real lasting impact" on the brain health of people over 50, researchers have suggested.

A study by the University of Exeter and the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology & Neuroscience (IoPPN) at King's College London found that working memory and cognitive function in older people rapidly declined during the pandemic, regardless of whether people were diagnosed with Covid-19 or not.

Staying healthy in later life can sometimes be complex, especially if other health problems are in the mix.

But, generally speaking, is there anything people can do to help keep their cognitive function and memory sharp in their 50s and beyond? We asked some experts...

Don't stop learning

There's often a belief that once you reach a certain age, it's 'too late' to learn anything

"But that isn't really the case," Dr Anthony Thompson, postgraduate psychology programme leader at Arden University told the PA news agency. "In fact, research shows that lifelong learning, along with formal

important factor behind our health and security as we grow older.

"Research shows that learning new skills and acquiring knowledge can stimulate the growth of new neural connections and increase the brain's overall plasticity. This can have a range of positive effects on cognitive function, including improved memory, attention, and problem-solving skills.

Having an active older generation - whether that is through working or volunteering - reaps personal benefits and economic benefits for following generations."

Whether it's volunteering, taking up a new hobby, musical instrument or language, find new things to keep your mind well oiled.

Stav active

"Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity aerobic exercise per week," said Dr Adam Moreton, consultant older adult psychiatrist at Pall Mall Medical. "I wouldn't recommend everybody take up marathon running, but most people can find some way to gradually and gently increase their levels of activity.

There's a wealth of research linking higher rates of physical activity with better physical and mental health in later life - including cognitive decline.

Get plenty of sleep

Moreton added: sleep is essential for memory consolidation and cognitive function. Aim for seven to nine hours of uninterrupted sleep per night. Some people can manage on less, and how much sleep you need can change as you get older," he added. "But you should wake feeling refreshed in the morning and if that isn't happening, then perhaps you aren't getting enough sleep or there is another problem (such as depression) getting in the way."

If you are struggling to sleep, check in with your GP in case there's anything else going on that they can help with.

Be mindful of your diet and alcohol intake

The food and drink we consume is also a major factor for maintaining brain health.

Moreton said: "A diet rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains and lean proteins can support brain health. Omega-3 fatty acids, found in fish and nuts, may also be beneficial. It isn't about denving yourself things you enjoy, that's important too, but what you eat is essentially fuel for your body and your brain.

"Be sure to drink enough water throughout the day. But excessive alcohol consumption and smoking can function. cognitive

Even if you can't stop completely, then any reductions will be helpful."

Relax!

"Chronic stress can also have a negative impact on cognitive said function," Moreton. "Practices meditation, deep breathing, and yoga can help reduce stress. Stress and depression can sometimes look like dementia - however, the distinction is important as treatment for stress and depression should help resolve the memory problem."

Make sure chronic health issues are well managed

Similarly, if you have chronic health conditions such as diabetes, hypertension and high cholesterol, these can also effect cognitive health, particularly as we get older. So it's important to follow your GP's advice and get your medication reviewed when necessary.

Stay connected

There are strong links between loneliness and social isolation and reduced physical and mental health - including cognitive decline. "Maintaining social connections and mentally active through conversations and social activities can support cognitive health," said Moreton. "Evidence shows that preventing social isolation helps prevent dementia.'


Can brain training apps help?

"Yes, some studies show an improvement, whilst others found brain training to be ineffective," said Abbas Kanani, a pharmacist at Chemist Click. 'Brain training games are designed to test your memory with a range of different games and challenges. This may help to sharpen certain skills that can deteriorate with age, such as decision making, reaction time, and short-term memory.

Moving house? How to tackle a new garden

By Hannah Stephenson, PA

When Gardeners' World presenter Frances Tophill moved to her twobedroom stone cottage in Devon, she inherited the biggest garden she had ever owned.

There, she has created her own pocket of paradise, but has learned much along the way, as she explains in her new book, A Year In A Small Garden.

Here, she offers tips to anyone who has just moved and is wondering what to do with their new plot of land in the next year.

1. Watch and learn

"The first year, I would just almost be observing what the garden does. The light changes so much from winter to summer, the position of the sun. You learn where there are wet patches and dry patches, windy patches, or there might be bits that never get any rain because a wall gives you a rain shadow."

2. Try to do the minimum

"See what comes up. In my garden I had daffodils, rhubarb and things that I thought had died or I didn't think there was anything there and suddenly you have growth shooting from the soil.

"Doing the very minimum is really important, because if you take the



time to do that then by the time you put pen to paper to make a little design of what you want your garden to be, you'll know which bits you can use, where the sun hits, where you want to sit and where you want to store stuff.

"You can also find what your natural pathways are and how you move through the space, and you'll also learn what you like and what you don't like.'

In time, you may want to move plants that have emerged but might be in the wrong place.

Moving plants is best in autumn or spring, or for a shrub or a tree, when it's fully dormant."

3. Keep a diary

"I made notes, kept a diary, maybe because I'm not a particularly organised person. What tends to happen is that you notice the things that matter.

"I noticed, for example, that my garden has a very big wall to the south side, so in the middle of winter I get no sun at all because the low sun is behind that wall all the time. When I moved in February last year I realised I had no sun, but in March the sun hit the corner of the garden and I wrote that down.

"Those detailed observations will help you to work out where to put plants that need sunlight and where you won't be able to put certain

4. Take photos

"Definitely take photos because that will jog your memory and you'll see what was where. See how it's comparing to what it was before."

5. Test your soil

"Work out how alkaline or acid the soil is - soil testers are easily available from garden centres. Also look at how wet the soil is. Do a bit of a dig, see how many worms you have, assess the condition of the soil.

"If the soil is very wet in the winter it might be very dry in the summer. A lot of clay soils, for example, store the water in the soil in the winter and then bake solid in the summer.

"If you don't want the soil to be

quite as wet, add organic matter, compost or manure, once the soil has dried. Never add organic matter to waterlogged soil because it then breaks down and creates lots of anaerobic bacterial conditions will which make it worse.

"Once the soil has dried out a bit, dig in organic matter that will the slowly improve structure of the soil. Adding grit can help but gets generally that sucked into the clay anyway and doesn't make a huge differ-

6. Choose suitable plants for your soil

"This is the best thing to do. On permanently wet ground you might grow bog plants like ligularias, filipendula, astilbes and ferns. If you have soil that is wet in the winter and dry in the summer, plant more of the floodplain plants like astrantias and veronicastrums."

7. Don't tidy up too much

If your new garden is totally overgrown, full of brambles and weeds, without any semblance of order, don't clear it too vigorously, Tophill suggests.

'You are going to want to clear, whether you get a brush cutter or just lay down cardboard to suppress some of the weeds and create some beds, or just mow parts through it, which can be a really nice way to give you access. If you must clear, do it with gentleness.'

8. Make friends with the neigh-

"That is really important, especially if you are planning on doing any kind of work. Get to know people first so they know you're all right. I've learned this.

Indeed, a month after moving in, a BBC camera crew came in to film her



garden for Gardeners' World, and she also had a greenhouse built which takes up about a fifth of her outdoor space. Although she had told neighbours, it took a bit of getting used to.

9. Focus on your own needs

"Work out what you want or need as a couple or a family or if you're on your own. For a lot of people it's just a bit of fresh air and maybe a kind of outdoor room that they're going to use to sit in, but a lot of people want to grow vegetables. Is that going to be what your garden needs?

"Do you need storage, a lawn mower, a lawn, or a low-maintenance spot to chill out after a day of working at a computer?

"Try to distil your own needs from the garden and combine that with your observations. I'd also write that down. What do you want from the garden? What do you need from the garden? You can probably take quite a few of the things off the want list. You might be able to combine some of the two.'

10. Keep it simple

"If you try to fit too much into a small space, it will look smaller and more cluttered."
